Attraction of Beauty

Attraction of beauty pervades our ordinary experiential domain. Beauty not only attracts us but also sets the horizon of our life. Light and shadow make beauty visual, playful, and enjoyable. In attraction and repulsion, we exercise our freedom to choose truth, goodness, and beauty (*Satyam, Shivam*, and *Sundaram*).

In the celebration of Creation, God's darshan of beauty is remarkable. "Let there be light", and there was light. God saw the light was good" (Gen1:3). "God saw all that he had made, and it was very good" (Gen 1:30). The creation unfolds beauty as it marches to its destiny. "God created humankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them" (Gen 1:27). Sharing the image and likeness of God, human beings also see the truth, goodness, and beauty of creation.

Through our sight, hearing, touching, tasting, and smelling of the creation and our experience, we behold God's beauty and bliss. "For God, who said, "Let light shine out of darkness", made his light shine in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of God's glory displayed in the face of Christ (2 Cor 4:6). And "We have seen his glory. . . full of grace and truth" (Jn 1:14). Human beings as the image of God's glory and beauty, share in the joy of Lord: we are the epiphany of God.

Artists and works of art at the service of beauty inspire human imagination, contemplation, and action. Theology is celebrating the joy, beauty, and glory of our life in Christ with the world.

Han Urs von Balthasar writes, "Beauty is the Word that shall be our first. Beauty is the last thing the thinking intellect dares to approach since only it dances as an uncontained splendour around the double constellation of the true and the good and their inseparable relation to one another" (*The Glory of the Lord. Theological Aesthetics*, 17).

Attracted to the beauty of Jesus, Saint Kuriakose Elias Chavara of the Holy Family wrote, "The Lord of mercy, the Son of God, His exuberant beauty, I long to see" (*Atmanutapam*, III, 1-2).
